In both his ministry and public life, Rich integrates faith with service, having worked in government, education, and global health. He also is the co-founder of initiatives that connect social impact investing with real-

world change.

Rev. Tafel continues to teach, speak, and lead at the intersection of spirituality, public leadership, and civic renewal—living out a Swedenborgian call to serve the common good through love and wisdom in action. He also is the chair of the Council of Ministers.

A Tribute to the Departing Messenger Editor

The Year of the Word: 2024-25

 $\mathbf{F}^{ ext{or}}$ the past five years, Beki Greenwood has wowed our world with beautiful issues of *the* Messenger, and while we wish her well in her departure, we are surely sad to see her go. Her first issue was the February/March issue in 2020, which we will remember was at the very cusp of the outbreak of the COVID shutdown. During this phase of anxiety with lockdowns and shortage of gatherings, Beki stepped in with beautiful graphic design skills to nourish our imagination during that year and longer. She also helped strategize a streamlining of a publication system that prioritized online delivery with all its colorful attributes while minimizing the expensive black-and-white print versions via the US and Canadian mails. Looking through her issues over the past half-decade provides a vivid picture of the life of the Swedenborgian Church of North America. Her work continued an important function in our Church's history, given that the Messenger has been our official organ of denominational communication since 1855.

At that time the still young denomination decided that it was time to have a regular organ coming regularly to homes and churches, and the name they chose was *The New Jerusalem Messenger*. The

name has evolved some over the many decades to *New Church Messenger* for nearly a century and was shortened simply to *The Messenger* in the late Sixties that was clarified a tagline in smaller print: "Official Organ of the General Convention of Swedenborgian Churches," which itself evolved in the mid-Nineties to tag *The Messenger* the "Official Organ of the Swedenborgian Church of North America."

It is our official organ of communication, and if you line up the full run of *Messengers* from beginning to the current moment (and I have done this in our library), Beki's *Messengers* jump out with their vivid colorful and artistic designs. You can spot them from thirty yards away.

With great gratitude and appreciation, we salute and celebrate Beki Greenwood's contribution and gift to our current life and our history. We are delighted to report as well that we have an interim editor to step in immediately in Brittany Price, who was recently our Central Office manager, who possesses excellent editorial and graphic design skills. We will be running an open search for the permanent editor's position, but for now we pause to be thankful for the talent and production of Beki Greenwood.

he Center for Swedenborgian Studies will convene its annual Corporation meeting at the Annual Convention of the Swedenborgian Church of North America in Portland, Oregon. The Convention is scheduled for June 27 to July 1, 2025, and the CSS Corporation meeting is scheduled for Sunday, June 29.



Proposed Dissolution Clause for the Center for Swedenborgian Studies

Current Article X will become Article XI
Current Article XI will become Article
XII

NEW Article X. Dissolution

Any action to dissolve the Corporation of the New Church Theological School (dba The Center for Swedenborgian Studies) must be approved by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Board of Trustees before being referred to the eligible Voting Members of the Corporation. There shall be a meeting of the Corporation called to specifically consider such action, for which meeting legal notice has been issued to all Members eligible to vote in accordance with the provisions of these bylaws. At said meeting, if 2/3 of all of those physically present and eligible to vote agree to dissolve the Corporation of the New

Church Theological School, then all of its property, real and personal, after paying all just claims upon it, shall be conveyed to and vested in the General Convention of the New Jerusalem in the United States of America or its legal successor. The Board of Trustees of the School shall perform all actions necessary to this end.

The annual payout of invested funds is to be conveyed to the General Convention of the New Jerusalem and may be used to fund programs that met the Mission of the New Church Theological School during its existence:

- To prepare qualified individuals for ministry in the Swedenborgian Church and world
- To serve as a center on the leading edge of Swedenborgian scholarship
- To share its resources of scholarship, leadership, and people with the wider church and community.

The Annual Meeting of the Corporation of the New Church Theological School (d.b.a. the Center for Swedenborgian Studies of the Graduate Theological Union) will be held during the annual convention of the Swedenborgian Church of North America, Sunday, June 29, 2025 at 3:15 PM PT, in the University Place Hotel Ballroom, Portland State University in Portland, Oregon.

Convention 2025 Accommodations – Explained!

here are a few important updates to accommodations this year as we prepare for the 201st Annual Convention of the Swedenborgian Church of North America.

What's New in 2025?

- Everyone, including teens, will stay in the hotel this year—no dorms at all.
- Teens (ages 13–18) only need to pay the registration fee of \$110. If a teen stays in a double room in the hotel with other Swedenborgian Church Youth League (SCYL) teens, their room and board will be fully covered thanks to generous donations. Parents are not required to stay with them—they'll be housed together as part of the supervised SCYL program.

This is a big shift from past years, when SCYL participants stayed in dormitories—this year, they'll enjoy the comfort of hotel accommodations alongside the rest of our community.

Hotel Details

We've blocked out a limited number of rooms at the University Place Hotel and Conference Center in Portland, Oregon, for the discounted rate of \$110 per night plus taxes and fees—\$25 less

-Meal Package

-4 Days: \$325

-5 Days: \$415

-Adult/Teen: \$110

-Commuter: \$55

than last year's rate.

Each room (double or king) includes a mini fridge and access to hotel amenities like the pool and fitness center.

Important: You must book your room by calling the hotel directly at 503-221-0140 and mentioning you are with the Swedenborgian Church of North America. There is no online booking platform. More information: www.uplacehotel.com

Youth & Family Accommodations

- Teens (13–18) staying in a double room with the SCYL group only need to pay the registration fee (room and board are free).
- Youth (0–12) staying with parents will have all meals fully covered and no registration fee.
- Families only pay per room, not per person—making this a great value for families.
- Children under 13 must stay in the same room as a parent or legal guardian.

Meals

This year, meals are fully catered by the hotel—a big upgrade from previous years, when meals were provided through dormitory cafeterias. The Meal Package includes:

- Hot breakfast each morning (except July 1, which includes continental breakfast provided by the hotel)
- Hot lunch
- Catered dinner
- Snacks and reception desserts and hors d'oeuvres

The cost for Lay Attendees is \$325 for the full meal package. You'll enjoy varied, high-quality meals in a relaxed setting—all conveniently located onsite. A catered banquet dinner with a

Learn how to get over these hurdles and what audio/visual tech your church should implement to achieve a successful hybrid or fully digital ministry.



Rudy Caseres is the Digital Communications Manager for the Swedenborgian Church of North America. This will be his third Annual Convention serving as audio/ visual technical director. He has

recently worked in-person with Wayfarers Chapel's Exploring New Earth digital ministry and upgraded Fryeburg New Church's hybrid services. His goal is to teach member churches what he has learned from these experiences.

The Labyrinth as a Spiritual Praxis Dr. Dylan Odhner

This course will be in-person on campus. Course Description: Experience the labyrinth as a tool for spiritual reflection and renewal. This course combines history, symbolism, and handson practice, featuring both an openwalk and a guided "Tour of the Holy City New Jerusalem" Audio-Journey. Step onto this ancient path and explore how movement, meditation, and Swedenborgian insights can deepen your spiritual practice.

Dr. Dylan Odhner is a seasoned educator



with extensive experience teaching at the high school, college, and graduate levels. His passion for fostering intellectual curiosity and critical thinking reaches beyond the classroom

to educational travel planning, curriculum development, and the designing of sacred spaces. He is the founder of Golden-Thread Labyrinths, a unique venture specializing in designing, building, and facilitating missionfocused meditation labyrinths, and labyrinth activities.

What are the Main Differences of the Swedenborgian beliefs from mainline Christianity, and Why? Rev. Junchol Lee

This course will be in-person on campus.

In this Mini Course, I will to explore and point out what makes the Swedenborgian belief uniquely different from other religious beliefs, and even other Christian denominations, and thus makes it as an antidote to many poisons from shortcomings of Christianity, and ancient religions in general. One expectation is that after this Mini Course, people may be able to answer the age-old simple question, "How are you different?



After his ordination in July, 2000, Junchol served on many committees of the General Convention including Executive Committee of Council of Ministers (six

years), Ministry Support Unit (three years), Committee of Admission into Ministry (seven years), the General Council (one year), and served SCYL as the Youth Chaplain for seven terms. Also, Junchol offered Mini Courses at Convention for many years, and delivered

lectures at the Almont Summer Camp. Junchol is deeply interested in the spiritual aspect of education for all Swedenborgians, and finding ways to connect people with the teachings of Emanuel Swedenborg. Currently, Junchol is serving the San Francisco Swedenborgian Church as Senior Pastor.

Glorification: An Overview Rev. Dr. Gard Perry

This course will be hybrid for both inperson and remote attendees.

The aim of this Mini Course is to

bring Swedenborg's treatment of the glorification within reach of our understanding. There are four (4) topics: 1) Swedenborg's summary of



the process; 2) problem statement and solution; 3) a brief biography of the historical Jesus; and 4) Swedenborg's spiritual psychology. Swedenborg's summary is from True Christianity; George Dole identified a problem of interpretation and a solution with his meta translation method; the biography of the historical Jesus builds on current scholarly consensus; and spiritual psychology is framed as "a search for truth with an aim to deepen our love for the Lord and for the neighbor."

Swedenborg's glorification summary will sound familiar, though things get difficult when we turn to his stepby-step process in the Arcana (aka, Secrets of Heaven). Large words like celestial, spiritual, and natural have multiple levels of meaning in various contexts. That prompted George Dole to apply a meta translation method of interpretation - employed here to discover what the glorification sounds like to our 21st Century lived experience. A key finding is that Swedenborg's treatment of the glorification can reach our

understanding as the capacity for a deeper kind of empathy. Welcome!

Rev. Dr. Gard Perry has engaged the sections of Swedenborg's Latin text that treat the Lord's glorification for more than two decades and offers a summary of his findings in this Mini Course. Gard began his Swedenborgian life as a child at the Fryeburg New Church Assembly (FNCA) and has come full circle to be an FNCA senior lecturer. Gard has served on numerous boards and committees, currently serving on the Board of Trustees of the Center for Swedenborgian Studies, the Tafel Fund, and Council of Ministers. Gard's aim is to cultivate a practice of research and development for a 21st Century understanding and application of Swedenborgian ideas.

Swedenborg, Alchemy, and Activism: Life of an American Philosopher-Soldier Rev. Dr. Jim Lawrence and Michael Goos

This course will be hybrid for both inperson and remote attendees.

Michael Goos and Jim Lawrence are working on a new book retrieving Ethan Allen Hitchcock's reading of Swedenborg as a hermetic and alchemical philosopher (Swedenborg, A Hermetic Philosopher, 1859). Regarded internationally as the most important American contributor to hermetic studies in the 19th century, Hitchcock is also legendary among Native Americans for his torrid campaign against the United States government for its abuse of Native Americans. Abraham Lincoln recruited Major General Hitchcock to serve in his cabinet as a war advisor, and Hitchcock was chosen to stay with Lincoln's body for two days after the assassination. This Mini Course will explore the social justice activism and philosophical interpretation of Swedenborg by an American hero.

Michael Goos is a student at the Center for Swedenborgian Studies, an ordinand with General Convention, and a recipient of the Nunc Licet scholarship who is deeply grateful to be a member of the Swedenborgian community. In addition to pursuing the ministry, Michael aspires to lift-up neglected

Monday, June 30 at 10:30 AM PT

Paul: The Difficult Apostle Dell Rose

This course will be in-person on campus.

Paul of Tarsus was one of the most complex and influential thinkers of all time. He was the main influence in spearheading the Jesus-Movement's transition from another Jewish messianic sect to the most successful religion of all time, Christianity. However, the dominance of his thought has also obscured the multiplicity of Christian interpretations, Swedenborg's included. Swedenborg struggled with the legacy of the difficult apostle, his ubiquity, and his qualifications 'to speak for the Lord.' In this seminar we will consider Swedenborg's critiques of Paul by highlighting the personal similarities they shared, and how both struggled to put into a system their own personal experiences of the Lord. To see Paul and Swedenborg as two travellers down the same metaphoric highway, I hope to shift the focus to the rhetorical strategies that each used to convey their teachings and reduce Paul's status as the primary exponent of the Gospel. It is hoped that by presenting this material it will give Swedenborgians the

ability to engage seriously other Protestant movements who center Paul's understanding of the Christ event and to effectively engage with them.

Dell J. Rose is program director at the

Swedenborg Library Chicago and is Swedenborg Society (UK) Doctoral candidate at the Centre for the History of Hermetic Philosophy at the University of Amsterdam.



His eclectic intellectual interests focus on the interplay between elite culture and esoteric spiritual currents in several different social and political contexts. At present, he is working on a monograph focusing on Swedenborgianism in Meiji Japan (2026), and his dissertation considers Swedenborgian political movements across the globe. His publications include studies of Southcottianism, British Israelism, the nascent history of the Bahálí faith, as well as Old Norse and Welsh legal history.

Tools for Healing the Pain of Polarization

Rev. Roslyn Taylor

This course will be in-person on campus.

Most people would agree that we

are living in very divisive times, around the world. Many of us are suffering from personal losses due to polarization and the relationship frac-



tures that can result from an "us versus them" mentality, whatever the context. Rooted in Swedenborgian teachings, this Mini Course explores two tools to use as pathways to bridge divides and restoring relationships. Through

Rev. Roslyn Taylor is a minister with the Swedenborgian Church of North America, living in Bryn Athyn, Pennsylvania. She has been the spiritual leader of the Home Church in Bryn Athyn since 2003. She was the editor of a volume of essays by Swedenborgian authors, published in 2005 as Healing Words: A Sampler of Wholeness Theology. More recently, she founded the Deborah's Tree ministry in 2021, which promotes the work of female Swedenborgian scholars, writers, clergy, and artists. Rev. Taylor has been active in the Gathering Leaves retreats for Swedenborgian/New Church women since 2004 and is currently chairing the Steering Committee for Gathering Leaves 2025.

Honoring Historic Sacred Spaces: Restoration and Evolution Rev. Shada Sullivan

This course will be hybrid for both inperson and remote attendees

The Church of the Holy City in Wilmington Delaware is one of the oldest Swedenborgian churches in the United States. It has a fascinating history, and it continues to hold space for a vibrant congregation and evolving uses. Historic buildings need intentional and ongoing care, which takes time and resources. This mini-course will discuss the history of The Church of the Holy City, its current uses, and knowledge gained from its restoration journey, which includes being a recipient of a prestigious National Fund for



Sacred Places challenge grant.

Rev. Shada Sullivan has been the Pastor at The Church of the Holy City in Wilmington Delaware since 2017. She is a founding member of the leadership team of Swedenborgians in Action Against Racism, and is co-chair of the SCNA Social Justice Committee. Rev. Shada grew up in The New Church in Australia, and has been living in the United States since 1994. She has two daughters, one of whom recently graduated from college.

Meditation for Children Sarah Wood Vallely



American groups eventually founded the General Convention of Swedenborgian Churches.
